2007 has been full of exciting activities on many fronts.

Final designs for the Agnes Varis Campus Center were presented for approval in May to the Tufts Board of Trustees. Renovation of Building 16 is expected to begin this summer. Team Jumbo West exceeded its \$28,000 fund raising goal for the April 16th running of the Boston Marathon thanks to the efforts of team members and their supporters both on and off the Cummings campus. We are very grateful to everyone for their support of the effort to raise funds for purchase of exercise equipment for the Agnes Varis Campus Center.

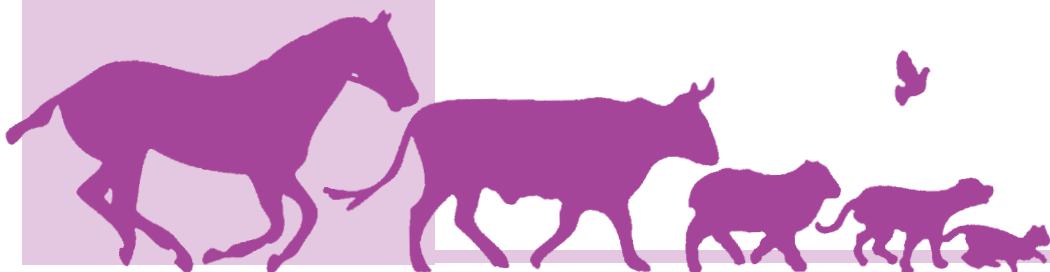

## ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

### Hugh Mainzer V90

Captain Hugh M. Mainzer has been selected by Acting Surgeon General Kenneth P. Moritsugu as the Chief Professional Officer for the Veterinary category of the Commissioned Corps of the U.S. Public Health Service (Corps) effective May 1, 2007. As Chief Veterinary Officer, Captain Mainzer is responsible for providing leadership and coordination of veterinary professional affairs for the Office of the Surgeon General and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). He also provides guidance and advice to the Surgeon General and the Veterinary Professional Advisory Committee on matters such as recruitment, retention, career development, and readiness of Corps veterinarians.

Captain Mainzer is a Supervisory Preventive Medicine Officer and Epidemiologist in the Division of Emergency and Environmental Health Services at the National Center for Environmental Health, a component of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). He has recently been designated by HHS as Commander of a deployable Applied Public Health Team designed to augment and assist with the provision of essential public health services to communities impacted by natural disaster, act of terror, or public health emergency. With background training and certification as a human Emergency Medical technician/paramedic and HAZMAT Technician, CAPT Mainzer is a strong advocate for the application of initiatives and activities designed to integrate veterinary proficiencies with the practices of all public health professionals.

In December of 2001, Captain Mainzer joined CDC's National Center for Environmental Health in his current role. He also serves as a team leader and assists CDC Emergency Response coordinators during natural disaster

responses as well as intentional acts of chemical, radiation, or biologic terror. He has responded and served as a preventive medicine technical advisor, resource coordinator, liaison team lead, and Public Health and Medical Services field office leader following five major hurricanes ~ the most recent being Hurricanes Katrina and Rita in 2005. He assisted with the delivery of environmental health and emergency medical services during the 1996 and 2002 Olympic Games, has assisted the investigation of several cruise ship outbreaks, several large outbreaks of waterborne pathogens as well evaluation of community exposure to mold conditions in homes following heavy floods. Captain Mainzer served as a CDC Environmental and Occupational health team leader as part of the Federal Government's response activities following the September 2001 attacks as well as the intentional anthrax release in the United States. He has co-authored over 20 scientific articles on topics ranging from animal welfare and reports of communicable disease outbreak responses, to investigations of environmental hazards and evaluations of vaccine delivery programs.

Captain Mainzer is a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Preventive Medicine and served for 4 years on the specialty's examination committee. He is also a Fellow of the American College of Epidemiology. Since 2001, Hugh has served on the advisory panel of the American Veterinary Medical Association's House of Delegates and has completed 6 years of service as a Director of the Commissioned Officers Association of the U.S. Public Health Service (COA) including 1 year as Chair of its Board of Directors. He is also past president of the American Association of Public Health Veterinarians. Captain Mainzer is an adjunct clinical instructor in the Department of Community Medicine and Family Health at the Tufts University School of Medicine, and Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Environmental and Population Health here at TCSVM.

## CREATION OF THE COMMUNITY FOR ANIMALS AND PEOPLE IN SOCIETY (CAPS)

All of us at the Center for Animals and Public Policy care deeply for nonhuman animals, and believe they matter in and of themselves. But when we think back to our first experiences with nonhumans—whether it was a backyard meeting with a squirrel or a front porch encounter with a stray dog—we realize most of our education about animals came outside the classroom. Which is why, in the fall of 2006, we created CAPS—the Community for Animals and People in Society—to advocate a home for humane education in the classroom. In particular, we created CAPS to serve the underserved, to enter low-income communities where teachers may lack the resources to discuss animals at all. We were inspired by the work of youth education programs already present at Cummings, namely Gap Junction, which encourages youth to consider careers in the life sciences. Using Gap Junction and the work of the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (MSPCA) as models, we created a trial humane education program for children ages 9-10.

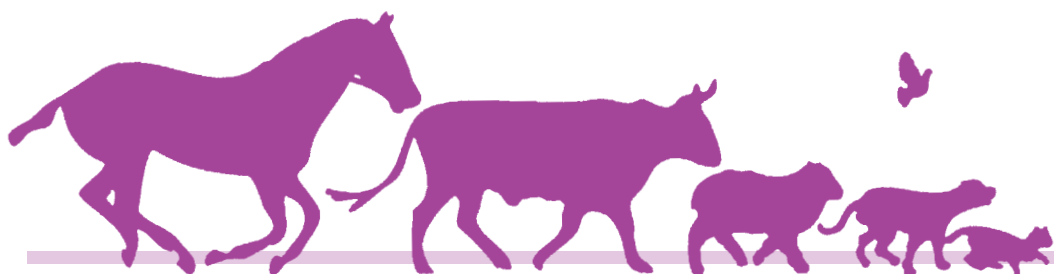
For our trial run, we created four, one-hour sessions to be held at the Boys & Girls Clubs Yawkey Club of Roxbury in Boston. In our first session, we sought to evaluate the children's basic knowledge of animals and discussed the challenges that come with caring for companion animals. Quickly, we realized our task may be more difficult than previously imagined. During the first activity that involved drawing an "Animal I

Know" and answering questions about him or her, many students seemed restless and distracted. On an individual basis, we engaged in some good discussions about the students' familiarity with caring for various companion animals. In sum, however, we realized that activities without movement and excitement would disinterest students who'd spent an entire day in school. So, we tested a game where the children had to act out an animal, and quickly realized that our entire lesson plan would need some adjustment. The next three sessions were therefore more site-appropriate (and hopefully more successful); in session two, we created a competitive game where students had to place an animal in its correct habitat; in sessions three and four, we'll expose students to various animal-related careers and reveal the quirky and exciting behaviors of some nonhumans.

Our program clearly has some kinks to work out before we expand to other schools in the Boston area and beyond. Still, we're hopeful that even a basic exposure to humane issues may create one more veterinarian or one more animal behaviorist. After all, changing one life is more than we could ask for.

## NEW BUSINESS MANAGEMENT CLUB AT CUMMINGS SCHOOL OF VETERINARY MEDICINE

When you look back to your days in veterinary school, do you remember the smell of formalin in anatomy lab, memorizing gram stain morphologies, or how nervous you were for your first spay? For most of you, the answer is likely yes. However, you may have fainter memories of time spent developing your business skills. As veterinary curricula have evolved, so has the presence of non-technical skills such as business planning and communication skills. With the advent of a new student organization called the Veterinary Business Management Association (VBMA), the education provided in the classroom is complemented by various other opportunities for students to develop these vital skills.

The VBMA was formed in 2003 at the University of Pennsylvania by Meghan Stalker, V'06. Unsatisfied with the lack of education regarding business management and leadership skills, Meghan traveled the country, helping to establish VBMA chapters at other schools (including Tufts). The VBMA is a student-driven organization dedicated to advancing the profession through increasing business knowledge, creating networking opportunities, and empowering students to achieve their personal and professional goals. Run completely by veterinary students, it is the largest independent veterinary student organization in the world and the fastest growing veterinary student group in the USA. The Tufts' chapter, with its 77 members, is part of the national VBMA network that includes 24 chapters and over 2,100 veterinary student members.

The VBMA offers business education beyond what is offered in the traditional veterinary school curriculum through both lunchtime talks and interactive workshops by guest speakers. The Tufts VBMA has had the pleasure of hosting speakers preeminent on the national speaking circuit, as well as some members of the local community. Past speakers include Dr. Jim Wilson, Dr. Rick DeBowes, Shawn McVey, Fritz Wood, Attorney Robert Treat, Dr. Cindy Fuhs, and more. For 2007-08, we look forward to hosting Dr. Lowell Ackerman, Dr. Jeff Thoren, Ms. Carolyn Butler, Dr. Bill Rosenblad, Dr. Randy Lynn, Dr. Jim Stevenson, and more. Our guests discuss topics such as communication skills, personal finance, applying for a job, conflict management, leadership skills, and client compliance. By instilling these types of skills in veterinary students, the VBMA hopes to elevate what is already a great profession to an even higher level.

In the near future, you will be receiving a survey administered by the VBMA to identify specific areas of business education that need the most attention in

the veterinary curriculum. You will also be receiving information about a project the VBMA is performing with the NCVEI, as well as a calendar of our events for 2007-2008. We are excited about the future of our organization and sharing with you our eagerness for the practice of veterinary medicine.
